But that is just the larger picture. For these are meticulously painted canvases, and the details reveal the real picture.

Countless landless peasants crowd around the surface in one. In another the flag of India is like a huge carpet being rolled out of existence by people of often conflicting faiths. The icons of great Indi-

ans are lost behind a layer of soot. Balaji makes subtle use of textual and visual puns to drive home his point. The imagery in these paintings is richly varied. He does make use of popular strategies as an attention-getting tactic but through this he explores the meaning of nationalism.

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
