Carrie Mae Weems named SCAD deFINE ART 2016 honoree

Annual celebration to include fine art exhibitions, lectures, performances and public events, Feb. 16-19

SAVANNAH — Feb. 01, 2016 — The Savannah College of Art and Design announces its deFINE ART 2016 honoree, Carrie Mae Weems, for the university's annual contemporary art showcase in Savannah and Atlanta, Georgia, and Hong Kong. In Savannah, a major exhibition by Weems will be on view at the SCAD Museum of Art in the Walter O. Evans Center for African American Studies opening Tuesday, Feb. 16, and run through Sunday, June 12. The exhibition, titled "Carrie Mae Weems: Considered," will feature photography and video works from many of the artist's iconic series. Weems' keynote lecture will take place at Trustees Theater in Savannah at 6 p.m Wednesday, Feb. 17.

Also on view at the SCAD Museum of Art will be solo exhibitions by Daniel Arsham, Roberto Behar and Rosario Marquardt (R&R Studios), Steven and William Ladd, Cornelia Parker, Robin Rhode, Alec Soth and Corinne Wasmuht. Among these projects are many site-responsive installations and works commissioned by SCAD for this year's showcase.

"For seven years, SCAD deFINE ART has presented the very best of international art, offering perspectives from the leading voices in today's cultural expression, and the 2016 showcase is no exception," said Melissa Messina, interim executive director of the SCAD Museum of Art and Savannah exhibitions. "I can't think



of a more appropriate person for SCAD to honor than Carrie Mae Weems, who, for more than three decades, has pushed the boundaries of photography, video, sound and installation to capture complex facets of the human condition and spirit."

SCAD deFINE ART is dedicated to presenting leading international artists alongside SCAD talent. Exhibitions of works by SCAD alumnus Lavar Munroe (B.F.A. illustration) and alumnus and Associate Dean of Academic Services Kent Knowles (B.F.A. painting) will be held in Savannah. A site-responsive installation by alumna Lauren Clay (B.F.A. painting) will be on view in Atlanta.

On Tuesday, Feb. 16, the SCAD Museum of Art will host a public conversation on the significance of the remarkable journey to freedom made by Ellen and William Craft. The university will dedicate a plaque honoring the life and legacy of the Crafts in the museum lobby. Art historian and curator Isolde Brielmaier, Ph.D., will moderate a dialogue with scholar and author Barbara McCaskill, Ph.D., and visual artist Xaviera Simmons.

Public programming at the SCAD Museum of Art will include an exhibiting artist panel discussion with Robin Rhode, Roberto Behar, Lavar Munroe and Rosario Marquardt, moderated by Gia Hamilton, director of the Joan Mitchell Center in New Orleans, Louisiana, at 2 p.m. on Wednesday, Feb. 17. A public lecture by Margery Arent Safir, Ph.D., president and director of The Arts Arena International Inc. and founder and artistic director of The Arts Arena in Paris, France, will be at 6 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 18.

SCAD FASH, the university's new museum dedicated to fashion and film in Atlanta, will present "A Fashionable Mind: Photographs by Jonathan Becker" and "Be Yourself; Everyone Else Is Already Taken," the first U.S. exhibition by London-based artist, stylist and designer Daniel Lismore. The first solo exhibition in the Southeast by artist Jeffrey Gibson will also be on view in Atlanta. Gibson will discuss his work during a lecture, titled 'one becomes the other,' at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 17, at SCADshow.

Celebrated French performance company Beau Geste will perform "Exceptional Transport: duet for a dancer and an excavator" in Atlanta on Tuesday, Feb. 16, at 5 p.m. and in Savannah at 7:15 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 19.

Hong Kong-born artist Kacey Wong, Ph.D., will share how he generates artistic concepts that reflect society during a lecture, titled "The Art of Resistance," at SCAD Hong Kong at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 17.

CARRIE MAE WEEMS

Over the past 30 years, Carrie Mae Weems has developed a complex body of art that employs photographs, text, fabric, audio, digital images, installation and video. Her work has led her to investigate family relationships and gender roles, as well as the histories of racism, sexism, class and political systems.

In a review of her retrospective in The New York Times, Holland Cotter wrote, "Ms. Weems is what she has always been, a superb image maker and a moral force, focused and irrepressible."

Weems has earned numerous awards, including the prestigious Prix de Rome and the U.S. Department of State's Medal of Arts, as well as many grants and fellowships from organizations such as the National Endowment for the Arts and Anonymous Was a Woman. In 2013, Weems earned a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation and a MacArthur Fellowship or "Genius Grant." Most recently, she received the Spotlights Award from the International Center of Photography and the W.E.B. Du Bois Medal from Harvard University.

She is represented in public and private collections around the world including those of the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City; The Museum of Fine Arts in Houston, Texas; and the Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles. She has participated in numerous solo and group exhibitions at major national and international museums including the Whitney Museum, the Museum of Modern Art and the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, all in New York City. In 2008, Weems collaborated with students, faculty and staff at the Savannah College of Art and Design to create "Constructing History," a series of photographs and video exploring recent American events.

Weems has been represented by Jack Shainman Gallery in New York City since 2008.
