Ruinart Champagne Announces Partnership with New York City Ballet, Becoming the First Official Champagne of the World-Renowned Dance Company

Partnership Launches Tonight at NYCB's Spring Gala, Celebrating the Ballet's 50th Year in Lincoln Center's David H. Koch Theater

New York (May 8, 2014)—Ruinart Champagne announces its partnership with the New York City Ballet (NYCB), marking its status as not only the world's first established Champagne House, but also the first official champagne of the renowned dance company. As part of the partnership, Ruinart will be served at NYCB's special events including the Spring Gala on May 8, and NYCB will launch a Ruinart Champagne bar for ballet-goers in the David H. Koch Theater's lobby beginning in September 2014.

At tonight's NYCB Spring Gala, the new official champagne will be poured throughout the evening as guests celebrate the 50th anniversary of the opening of the New York State Theater, now the David H. Koch Theater. The one-time only evening will feature works performed at the theater's inaugural performance in April 1964, as well as a world premiere ballet created by NYCB soloist Justin Peck, to a commissioned score by Sufjan Stevens.

Ruinart's new role highlights the natural pairing of two elegant occasions: enjoying a glass of champagne and attending a ballet performance. The partnership is also a seamless extension of Ruinart's established commitment to the arts. The champagne house has cultivated close, long-standing relationships with the art world through ongoing collaborations with contemporary artists and partnerships with a number of international art events.

NYCB will open the Ruinart Champagne bar timed with the opening of the Company's 2014 Fall Season this September. The bar will be located on the theater's Promenade.

In addition to the Ruinart Champagne bar, Ruinart will be the official champagne of the NYCB's prestigious special events, including their Spring and Fall Galas, as well as their Annual Luncheon. Ruinart will also be the champagne feted with during NYCB's world premieres and other special occasions.

These crayeres offer the triple benefit of a constantly stable temperature, the complete absence of vibration and a perfect humidity level, providing ideal conditions for the aging of the Ruinart wines and the golden thread of the Ruinart taste: fresh, luminous, and elegant.
