"What Nerve!"

at Matthew Marks, through Aug. 14 502, 522 and 526 West 22nd Street

One of the biggest galleries in Chelsea is playing host to a survey of alternative art groups from the 1960s to the early 2000s. This is a story of American art minus New York and Los Angeles: body socks knit in neon psychedelic patterns by Providence's Forcefield; chunky ceramic sculptures from the Bay Area's Funk Artists; freaky comics published by Chicago's Hairy Who; and documentation of performances by Ann Arbor's Destroy All Monsters. A version of this show appeared earlier this year at Providence's Rhode Island School of Design Museum. Curator Dan Nadel's scholarly approach to mapping under-appreciated artistic subcultures has, for the most part, been stripped away for this gallery presentation, which amounts to an elegant display of unruly aesthetic objects.
