

An empty building in New York City's Lower East Side has gone chiaroscuro. <u>Politics of Light</u>, a solo exhibition of Israeli artist <u>Jan Tichy</u>'s work, transforms 5,700 feet of raw space into a post-modern Rembrandt or Caravaggio.

Through seven light projects, Tichy explores the recesses of the sublime—what light reveals and darkness hides. The exhibition also includes single-channel videos, digital projections, sitespecific installations, and sculpture.

Surveillance is a major theme in the artist's work. *Project Cabrini Green* juxtaposes video footage of a Chicago housing development's demolition with relics of a light project that was installed in each apartment. *Recess* is a single vantage exposure of a public school playground. And *1391* is an architectural recreation of a secret prison located on an Israeli military base near Palestine's border. Tichy's model of "Israel's Guantanamo" is based on internet research.

Politics of Light is organized by <u>Richard Gray Gallery</u> and <u>No Longer Empty</u>, a public arts organization. It remains on view at 196 Stanton Street through December 14, 2013 (Wednesday – Saturday, 2-7pm).
