Matthew Jensen (b. 1980, United States) uses collection and photography to explore public landscapes, often finding uncanny treasures within well-trod sites. For *Wanderlust*, Jensen transposes the length and shape of the High Line onto other sites in New York City, creating annotated maps and walks of these areas that offer the chance to wander between the natural and urban world while journeying to number of lesser-known landmarks. Jensen's maps are available at the information station on the High Line at West 16th Street through fall 2016. Jensen will lead these walks on September 24, October 29, and November 5, 2016.

Open Studio: Matt Jensen's *A Collection of Walks (or How to Get to the Earth)*

As part of his "studio in the park" residency in Flushing Meadows Corona Park, sponsored by the Queens Museum and ArtBuilt, Brooklyn-based artist Matt Jensen has designed 14 walks, each beginning at a different New York City landmark and finishing at the park's Unisphere, a model globe designed for the 1964 World's Fair. This Thursday, Jensen hosts an open studio to introduce the routes he has designed and explain his process of collecting objects and taking photos during his walks, and later displaying them in his mobile studio.

Queens Museum, Flushing Meadows Corona Park, Queens
